<u>Dress for the Weather</u>



Activities from Ms.Marten's Class

Our class has been hard at work on various visual art and research projects.

We were given the unique opportunity to repurpose old skateboards for the brand new Pitikwé Skatepark. Pitikwé is a Cree word, which means "come on in." Our designs reflected the welcoming and inclusive space that they have created for everyone. If you ever find yourself at Pitikwé, check out our skateboards installed on their walls!

We also researched Indigenous Star Stories (constellations) which integrated with our science unit, the solar system. Some constellations we explored were the Mooz, Ajijaak, Maang, Wintermaker, Nanabozho, Ojiig, and more! After our research was finished, we painted galaxies on canvases and drew the constellations on a separate piece of paper, which was glued on top. We then added star stickers on top to reflect the constellation. Stop by our room (WWMPR) if you want to check them out!




The Mishipeshu constellation rises in late biboon (winter) and ziigwan (spring) when the grounds are still frozen. This constellation tells the Anishinaabe people to not go on the ice because the ice is thawing, and it would be dangerous to travel across waters.

When the ice melted, the Anishinaabe people would put tobacco offerings in the water for the spirit, before they go off in canones, so they would have safe travels. Mishipeshu controls bodies of water. In Greek/Roman constellations, the Mishipeshu is called Leo and Hydra.

There are many different tales about Mishipeshu. One goes like this...

A village was holding a dance and two women wanted to go. Everybody already left, and they were stuck on the other side of the lake. These two women were sisters in law and one of them was foolish because she tried to get across the island without acknowledging Mishipeshu. Her sister tried to warn her, but she did not listen. Out of nowhere, the panther whacked their canoe with its tail.


