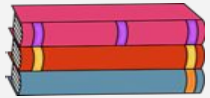

Message from Administrators:

At Amber Trails, we prioritize fostering a deep sense of belonging within our school community. We do this by fostering relationships that are based upon mutual understanding, trust, respect, care, and support. When individuals feel a strong sense of belonging, they experience a profound connection with others in our community, leading to a harmonious environment where everyone is motivated to look out for one another. We all share the responsibility of nurturing each other's social, emotional, physical, and spiritual well-being at Amber Trails. Through various clubs such as Gay Straight Alliance, Superkids, Indigenous Education Group, Black Student Union, Bhangra dancing, Ukrainian dancing, Hip-Hop, Pow Wow, Asian Heritage group, and a commitment to anti-racism, we ensure inclusivity and representation for all members of our community. Additionally, our staff reflects the diversity of our community, further strengthening our bonds. In the classrooms, our teachers use various strategies to foster a sense of belonging among students. These include sharing circles, classroom treaties, exploring identities and cultures, displaying family photos, honoring lived experiences, curating diverse classroom libraries, teaching conflict resolution skills, referring to the class as a family, and spending time outdoors connecting with the nature. We believe that students thrive academically and personally when surrounded by a supportive network of caring adults and peers. A strong sense of belonging is evident when a child feels close to their parents or guardians, trusts multiple adults in their life, knows their teachers cares about them, has meaningful friendships, and feels accepted within their peer group.

At Amber Trails School, creating a culture of belonging is fundamental to our mission of providing a nurturing and inclusive educational environment where every individual can flourish.

In support and celebration of Black history month, we reached out to Natasha Haines of Mumzie's cakes to showcase a local Black-owned business.

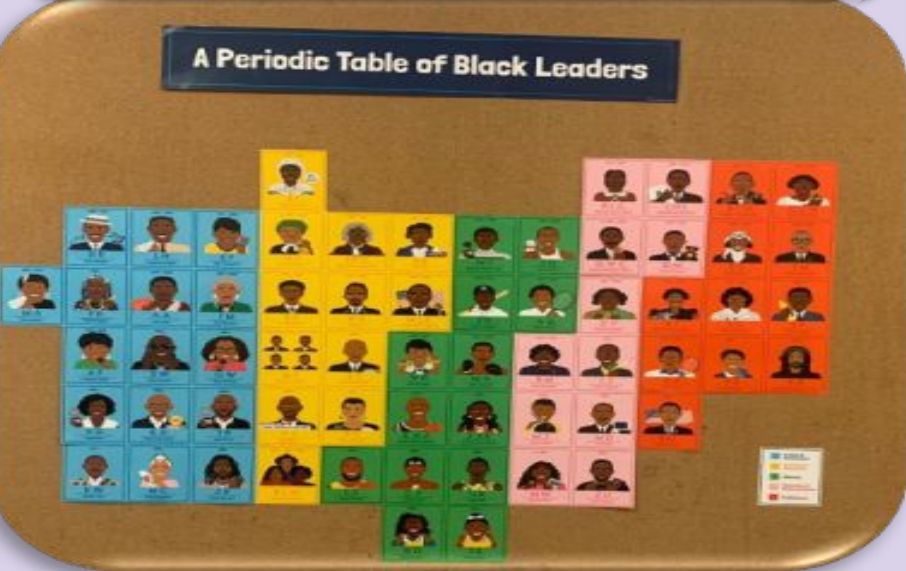
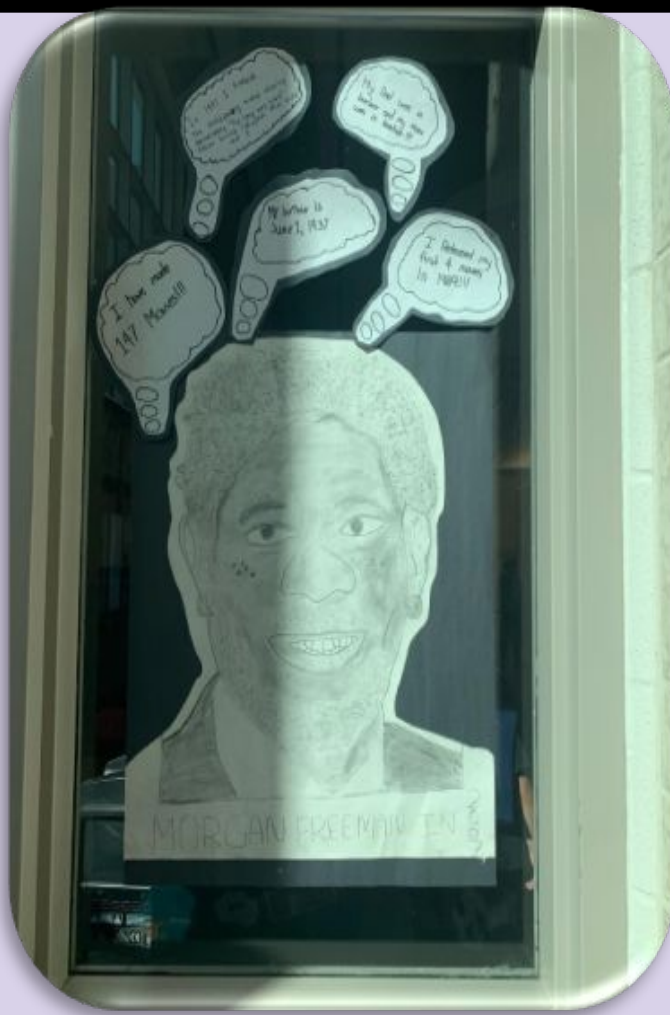


The students from many classrooms enjoyed baking with Ms. Paulette in the school Canteen.

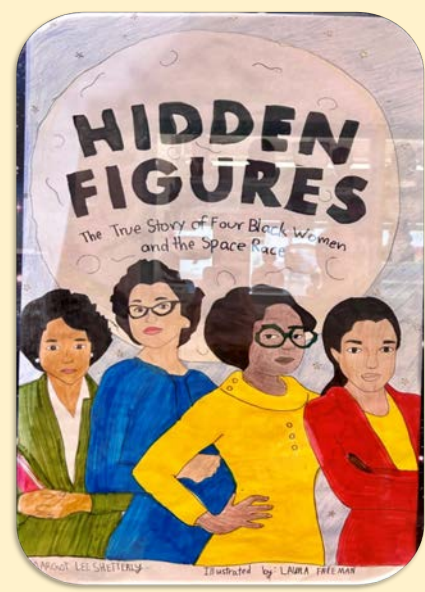
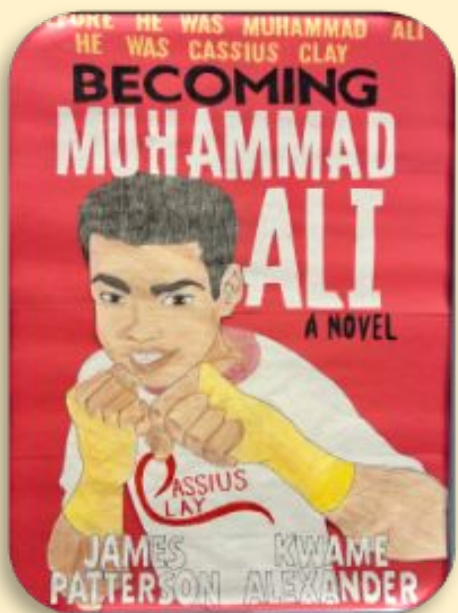


Amulet 9 Book Launch Party

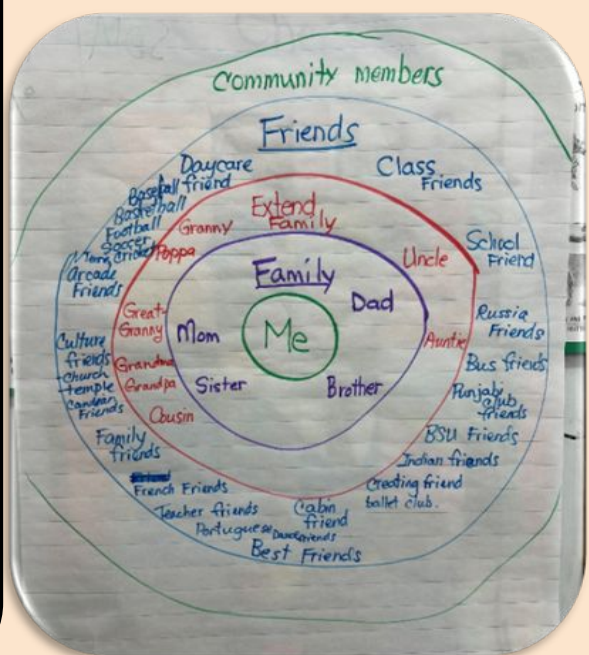
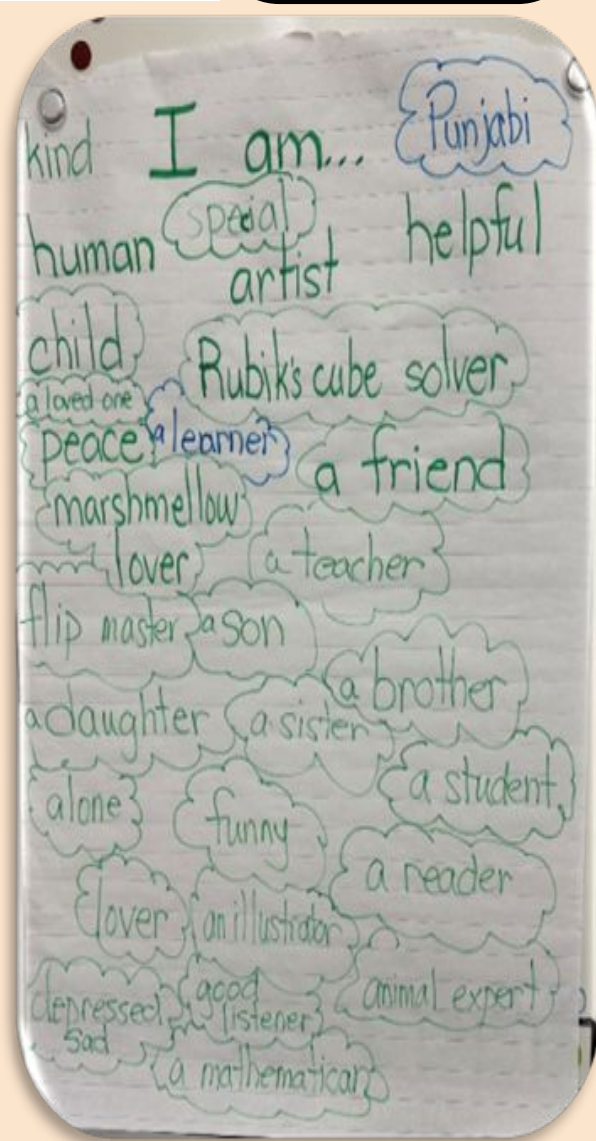
