


Mastery


Improving as writers with Regie Routman and Sandy Figueroa


Student X writing samples over 2 years




Gr. 1 Student X- Fall 2021














Gr. 2 Student X- Fall 2022


Jumping into Mathematics

This year at Elwick we have made a special focus on improving student number sense, computation skills and fact fluency. We have employed proven programs like Jump Mathematics and Mathletics to provide quality resources and programming, and many of our teachers have engaged in professional development seminars in order to give students the best possible chance at success in this area.

Our teachers also provide regular opportunities to practise "out of the box" problem solving skills through fun and engaging activities.


This multiphasic approach will help to ensure that we provide a strong skill base for our students to become expert mathematicians and problem solvers throughout their entire lives.

In early years classrooms, there has been a shift from relying on worksheets to teach math concepts to a more balanced approach that includes using more hands-on manipulatives and more engagement in small group work to help deepen children's understanding and collaboration skills.

Beginning full-day kindergarten is an exciting new step for your child and for you. A full day of learning early in life has many benefits. Elwick Community School's FIRST Musical Theatre Production at Seven Oaks Performing Arts Centre!



Generosity

Green Team!

This year, Grade 5 and 6 students from rooms 12 and 16 took on the role of environmental leaders at Elwick. They worked hard to teach all of the classes about composting and how best to give back to our earth by turning our food scraps into soil to grow new food rather than sending it to the landfill. Each week, compost was picked up from every pod, combined and put out to be taken to the Divisional Aki Centre where it was turned into soil in the Novi-Comp. Grade 5 and 6 students were also in charge of recycling for the school. They educated classes about what should be recycled and emptied the hallway recycling bins into the parking lot every Friday, with the help of our dedicated custodian, Mr. Jerry! Recycling and compost used to be a job taken care of by adults in the school, but this year, Grade 5 and 6 leaders worked hard to take on this important responsibility and educate everyone about living more sustainably for future generations.

Student Leadership Thrives here!

This past school year, we were able to finally bring back our student-led leadership club in full force. The club is made up of students in grades five to eight who wish to make our school and community a better place. Our students were able to show generosity by giving their time leading our virtual school announcements each day, cleaning up breakfast dishes, picking up food for our 5 Days of Generosity Food Drive and helping in all school planned activities, like our annual Pow Wow and Grade Eight Farewell. Leadership students also planned and ran a grade 5 to 8 school dance and organized a school-wide bake sale with proceeds of \$327.35 going to the Manitoba Great Pyrenees Rescue. The Rescue even brought puppies for us to play with, to thank us for our hard work and generosity!

Leadership club allows students to have voice and even lead clubs. This year, a grade eight student ran an art club called "Watch Me Art Club" where he planned and taught the whole club for his peers once a month. Our club, in partnership with our MPIY group (Mino Pimatisiwin Indigenous Youth) even hosted a Student Leadership group from Thompson, Manitoba, from Wapanohk Community School for the day, to share ideas and build a relationship between our schools moving forward.

Students were able to continually pay it forward this year and so much can be learned from giving of yourself to help others. Can't wait to see what the students come up with in the 2023/2024 school year!



Mino Pimatisiwin Mentorship Program (MPIY)

This year, in partnership with Maples Collegiate, our grade 7 and 8 students had the opportunity to be part of an MPIY (Mino Pimatisiwin Indigenous Youth) group once a month. We started in our school gym where Maples students came and ran games to build relationships and connections to students for when they go to high school. Our students were able to play Indigenous games led by Blair Robillard and had culture infused in our time together. Our group also went to the Maples for a tour and we even helped deliver water to our Elders during the Annual Seven Oaks Graduation Pow Wow. We can't wait to continue this partnership next year.



Sistema

Sistema really rallied when it came to bringing the community back to where we were before COVID. It showed during our Family Nights and our concerts where families really came through and showed their love and support to our children. Sistema kids also felt empowered and empathetic towards their attitude for Sistema Winnipeg founder Lydia Heidrich's celebration of life where they performed musical pieces beautifully. Lastly, Sistema divisional staff were given the opportunity to learn about Sistema globally in Indianapolis, Indiana, where we learned and reinforced that Sistema's goal is to bring the attitude and mindset of equity and excellence through the gift of music education, which we instill in our kids to be holistic members of our society.





Independence

Emotional self-regulation classroom based focus

Students do their best learning when their brains are calm. Each day through our virtual "Mindful Minute" segment of the morning announcements, Elwick's team of guidance teachers share strategies with staff and students to help them get into the green zone for learning. In addition, students are given the tools to learn about and practise self-regulation through collaborative co-teaching practices. These rich and lively lessons involve the Elwick support staff along with classroom teachers. Elwick students have also benefited from learning about the brain and its important role in making decisions every day.

Mental Health initiatives

Our guidance team has worked hard this year to address the wellness needs of our students at Elwick Community School. Some of our initiatives included: four school-wide themes focused on the Circle of Courage (Independence, Mastery, Belonging, Generosity); a week dedicated to mental health learning for students and staff; and a school-wide mental health survey to generate student voice and help us determine next steps in our learning. Guidance teachers co-taught lessons in grades 3 to 8 with a focus on balance, emotional regulation and living a good life.



Mobile Vision Clinic

For the first time at Elwick School, a classroom was transformed before our eyes into an optometry clinic. The Mobile Vision Clinic performed comprehensive eye exams on many of our students, checking their vision as well as eye health at no cost to families. It was a new and powerful experience for many students, especially those who could now see the world so clearly after picking out a beautiful new pair of cool glasses. We are excited for our upcoming eye clinic during the 2023/2024 school year where all Elwick students can participate, once families complete a short form available from classroom teachers or in the office. Belonging

Indigenous teachings

Throughout the school year, Elwick School's curriculum centred around embracing Indigenous teachings that aimed to foster a deep sense of belonging and empowerment among its students. The school's annual Pow Wow stood as a vibrant embodiment of this commitment, inviting and celebrating all nations, thereby forging connections within the community. Elder Betty, our Elder in Residence, shared her profound gift of language, singing and drumming traditional Cree songs. The Beading Club provided a space for creative expression intertwined with cultural significance. Elwick Métis Days was a hands-on experience where students learned how to fillet fish, make and roast Bannock on a fire, alongside lessons about the Red River Cart and Métis music. The school commemorated National Day for Truth and Reconciliation and National Day of Awareness for Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women and Girls and Two-Spirit People, cultivating awareness and respect. These are just some of the ways Elwick School weaves Indigenous teachings into nurturing a strong sense of belonging.















Improving attendance

At Elwick we continue to help all students improve their daily attendance. We believe that when students come to school every day, school truly becomes their second home. Attendance helps students to build positive relationships with staff and other students, it gives them the tools to improve academic performances and more importantly, daily attendance offers an opportunity for belonging, community togetherness and positive self-esteem.

To help families improve their attendance, our school offers the walking school bus, daily phone calls from the office, home room teachers check-in phone calls and home visits from teachers and administrators. As we prepare for an exciting all-day kindergarten, our hope is that families will have an easier time getting all of their children to school everyday. Anti-racism and GSA teaching



We have established the GSA Club and Anti-Racism Club to actively promote inclusivity among our outstanding students. We have received support from Mr. Weekes, who has made special class visits to facilitate discussions on complex topics. Additionally, our Guidance team has been instrumental in promoting inclusivity throughout the school year. We have great faith in our students, as they have the power to make the world a better place by embracing everyone and fostering a sense of togetherness. The students at Elwick have greatly benefited from these clubs, as they have learned to respect and appreciate everyone's identity and culture. Throughout the year, we have celebrated various cultures through music, art, food and unique cultural events such as Diwali and Eid. These efforts have ensured that every child feels connected and valued as part of the Elwick Family and our school community.











Connecting with our school community post-pandemic

At Elwick Community School, we realized that it was crucial to foster a supportive and inclusive community post-pandemic. As a team, we wanted to ensure that our families and their children had a sense of safety and belonging at school. Our school staff establishes consistent and open lines of communication with families by incorporating multiple ways to communicate with the school, such as in-person meetings, telephone communication, home visits, emails and monthly newsletters.

Our school team provides resources and tips to help parents support their children's educational journey. We arranged a welcome to Kindergarten event where families could meet their teacher, their school team and their peers. We welcome parents to get involved in the school community by volunteering in school events and providing opportunities for families to connect and build a sense of community.

As a team, we provide resources and guidance on topics such as parenting and social-emotional development. We recognize that each family may have unique needs and circumstances. We offer individualized support and resources as needed, including referral to community services, counselling or academic interventions. Elwick also offers regular pre-school programs for families to participate in with their children. The First Teacher program also provides a high level of at-home support to families. Throughout the school year, our children and families have the opportunity to celebrate and recognize the diverse backgrounds and cultures of families in our school community. We celebrated our Elwick Community Pow Wow and BBQ in person. We were also very fortunate to celebrate Dawili by learning about our families' culture and traditions. These events made our Elwick students and families feel very welcome and where they belong.


Creating a sense of belonging for our whole school community and families is an important part of who we are at Elwick!













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
