
REPORT TO THE COMMUNITY

In connection with our Preschool program, Elwick hosted a Familly Games Night for families to enjoy an evening of boardgames fun, snacks, and plenty of laughter!






Grades 4/5 students engaged in a scientific inquiry in connection with the Divisional Science Camp.

## "WE ARE ALL TREATY PEOPLE" IS MORE THAN AN EXPRESSION AT ELWICK COMMUNITY SCHOOL...IT IS A REASON TO CELEBRATE.

From May 13-16, 2014 the homes surrounding Elwick Community School witnessed some interesting activity on the school grounds. The raising of the Tipi was a clear sign that something out-of-ordinary was afoot. Indeed, it was the beginning of Elwick's first Treaty Days, a four day event organized to celebrate our treaty relationship with Manitoba's First Nations peoples.

As I have learned, the beginning of all treaties began with a handshake... and that handshake has since become an important symbol for relationship. At our opening ceremony, each guest was greeted with a handshake which let each person know that they were welcomed and their presence in our school is an honour and a gift.

Throughout the next four days, students were treated to a variety of activities, many of which took place in the Tipi. Students listened to storytellers, played on the



drums, tried their hands at Soapstone carving and had a ton of fun laughing while they played First Nations games. This was a learning experience like no other!

One of the highlights of Treaty Days had to be the Pow Wow and feast. Elwick's own Pow Wow Club dancers were stunning in their regalia and you could not help but be proud as they made their way into the circle during Grand Entry. Equally as impressive were the three drum groups whose singing filled the air.

Treaty Days was an absolute success and many Thank You's must go out to the Elwick staff that made it happen! This is definitely how relationships are made!
