# MAY/JUNE 2013 NEWSLETTER

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May and June are always exciting and busy times in a school. Rather than winding down, the pace and rhythm of our days speeds up. There are projects to finish and start, celebrations and new beginnings, farewells and welcomes! Our school and classroom calendars are full of important dates and invitations. It is an amazing but exhausting time of year!

We have begun to plan for next year, looking at opportunities for children and adults alike. After much research, conversation and consultation, Governor Semple will be piloting a Balanced School Day for the 2013-14 school year. We had a very positive response from parents who responded and from our school staff. Research and feedback from schools in Manitoba who have implemented this schedule indicate that reorganizing the day in this way promotes a better learning environment, meets the nutritional needs of students in a more balanced way, and provides more time for quality physical activity and play. The Balanced School Day does not change our start time of 9:00 a.m. or our end time of 3:30 p.m. The Balanced School day schedule divides the school day into three 90-100 minute blocks of instructional time. Two longer nutrition and activity breaks are provided in the morning and afternoon instead of the traditional 15 minute recesses and noon hour lunch. This schedule creates equally balanced teaching/learning blocks in the school day. Nutrition breaks provide 15-20 minutes for eating and 20-30 minutes for activity. Since Kindergarten is a half-day program, they are not included in this schedule. We will be sending more information and ideas for packing lunches in the fall.

As many of you are aware, Mr. Anderson will not be returning to Governor Semple School. Mrs. Darrach has been officially appointed as our 'new' principal. We are all grateful for his years of dedication, care and leadership and will be thanking Mr. Anderson at a future assembly. We wish him all the best at Ecole Leila North.

#### Kindergarten Registration Began on February 25th.

Governor Semple School started accepting Kindergarten Registration on Monday, February 25th, 2013.

Registrations will be taken during regular office hours from 9:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. Please note that your child must be five years old by **December 31,2013** in order

to be eligible for registration for the fall Kindergarten classes. You must bring your child's birth certificate, medical card and proof of address when coming to register.

#### Families Ask....Why Multiage Classrooms?

We have a group of dedicated and enthusiastic teachers at our school in all of our classrooms. All strive to meet your child's needs and are caring professionals. All of our classrooms need to emphasize the creation of nurturing communities where students of various ages and stages of development work together and alongside each other to reach their own individualized educational and personal goals

Families will sometimes ask us, "What is a Multiage Classroom?" Multiage classrooms differ from single age classrooms in that students stay with the same teacher for two years or more. The students and teacher spend more time together allowing for greater continuity in programming. Some additional benefits may include:

Children experience various roles. The range of social relationships children build in a multiage classroom more closely reflects the diverse social situations individuals encounter in real life.

Teachers get to know children in depth, planning for their individual strengths, needs and interests. Time becomes a positive variable.

Continuity over two or three years can help diminish anxiety associated with moving to a new classroom and shortens the time it takes to learn new routines thereby increasing instructional time.

Multiage programs like other classrooms recognize that each student is at a different stage of learning and focuses on the strengths, needs and interests of the learner. Multiage programs address curriculum concepts, skills and understandings over a two to three year period.

Families have the opportunity to develop a relationship with classroom teachers over a longer period.

Multiage classrooms can reflect natural family groupings, siblings can be placed in the same classroom. This simplifies demands on families for attending class events, volunteering and communicating with the school.

Families may experience less stress related to beginning a new school year and adapting to the expectations and routines of a new classroom.
