### Land Acknowledgement

We would like to acknowledge that O.V. Jewitt Community School is located on Treaty I land, the original lands of the Anishinaabe, Ininewak, Aniishinin, Dakota, and Dene peoples, and on the homeland of the Red River Métis. We respect the Treaties that were made on these territories, we acknowledge the harms and mistakes of the past, and we dedicate ourselves to move forward in partnership with Indigenous communities in a spirit of reconciliation and collaboration.

A Land Acknowledgment is a simple, powerful way of showing respect. It is one step among many that we **need to take towards correcting the stories and practices that erased Indigenous people's history and culture and** toward inviting and honoring the truth. We hear this land acknowledgment in our school every morning. When we listen, we must be paying attention to the words being said and the message they carry. As people who live here on Treaty 1 land, we have responsibilities to the Earth and to each other. We say this land acknowledgment to show respect – Manaji'idiwin – to those responsibilities.



Thank you to families for coming to support these singers at their first OVJ community performance of the year!


















## WASTE AUDITS...
