





While some of the sculptures depict grief, pain, and sadness; many show the strength, hope, love, and faith that flourishes in Uganda today.






ROOM 26 – MR. SERZU

In Language Arts we have been looking at the elements of story writing. We have also been planning and writing our own stories.


SALLES 5 ET 8 – MME JONI ET M HALL


