Tell Us about Your Trees

Students were delighted and excited to partake in West St. Paul School's tree planting project, in which over 1600 tree seedlings were sent home to be planted in students' yards. The school received over 1000 hybrid poplar and over 500 white spruce seedlings from the Government of Manitoba's Trees for Tomorrow program. These seedlings were then divided up and distributed to the students to take home. Classrooms and hallways were filled with excited chatter as students each received three seedlings to carefully carry home. Students promised to take care of the seedlings and give them the attention they need to grow into strong trees that will not only fight climate change, but also provide shade and beauty to the West St. Paul community.

Tap Club 2010-2011



Social Justice in Grade 7: Child Soldiers Presentation



All year, Mr. Holmes' Grade 7 class has been reading books that focus on themes of social justice. At the beginning of the year, we read a book called *Iqbal* which focused on child slavery. During the second term, we read a novel called *A Little Piece of Ground* which focused on the ongoing conflict between Palestine and Israel. Recently, we finished a memoir entitled *A Long Way Gone* by Ishmael Beah.

This is a true story about a 12 year old boy from Sierra Leone who is forced to fight in his country's civil war. The book details the experience most child soldiers go through.

Ishmael was separated from his family, was given drugs, and brainwashed by adults to kill. Near the end of the memoir Ishmael is rescued by representatives from UNICEF and is taken away to be rehabilitated. Ishmael now works as a spokesman for the United Nations and runs his own charity organization.

On Friday, June 17th Mr. Holmes' and Mr. Rempel's classes were lucky enough to attend a presentation done by Esther, the nurse who helped rehabilitate Ishmael Beah. The presentation was done by three people. Melrose talked about the causes and impacts of the civil war in Sierra Leone. Esther talked about her experience rehabilitating Ishmael and answered the students' questions. Nyange, a grade 11 student from Windsor Park Collegiate and a survivor of the civil war in Sierra Leone, talked about the importance of getting an education. Nyange also talked about her charity organization *Global Backpacks for Sierra Leone*. Nyange's charity raises money and collects backpacks and school supplies for less fortunate students in Sierra Leone. Next year she will travel to Sierra Leone and deliver the backpacks and supplies she has collected. If you are interested in making a donation please talk to Mr. Holmes before the end of the year.

The presentation was very educational and emotional. We were all very lucky to hear first-hand accounts of what it is like to live through and survive a war. The students learned from Nyange how lucky they are to live in a safe country where they receive a free education and how important it is not to take this for granted. These three women are a perfect example of a concept we have been trying to learn all year - that one

person CAN make a difference in the world!!
