We, Grade 8s, who took part in the 30-hour famine on the weekend of Apriil 16-17th had an amazing time and had some new experiences. Since I am used to eating at least 4 times a day, it was harder not to. I wasn't hungry, strangely enough, but whenever the topic of food came up, I was dying of hunger. The only think I didn't like about the weekend was me getting a headache. It wasn't fun, but I lived through it. I enjoyed the activities we did, mostly the digital scavenger hunt, and the bigger or better project. I was surprised about the bigger or better contest. We started out with a paper clip and went door to door asking for something bigger or better than what we gave them in the first place. At the end, everything we collected went to a charity. Participating in the 30 hour famine was quite a challenge. I never realized how fortunate we are to be able to eat whatever we want when we want it. Sometimes, when I haven't eaten for a few hours I say that I am starving. Well, I have learned my lesson. People in poor countries like India, Namibia and Mozambique are the ones starving. They go days without food and usually have to drink dirty water. Those poor people don't have any choice but to stave and drink dirty and disgusting water. I had fun in the famine. It was a great experience, although I probably wouldn't do it ever again. During this event, I got to learn and participate in new games and events, see other people suffer just like me and experience what it is really like to starve. My favourite game that we played had to be bigger and better. I had to say, though, that for the most part, the famine was fun as long as you stayed busy and didn't think about doing a famine; then, you didn't feel hungry. I learned a valuable lesson while doing the famine which is: You aren't really starving until you really are.


The purpose of participating in the Famine is to us understand what it might feel like to have to deal with the issue of hunger and to raise funds to support World Vision projects world—wide.



Throughout the day, speeches were made by some of the mentors including Lori Mitchell, and in separate groups, the girls were able to tour the college and learn more about specific trades. The focus of the conference was to give young women more information about careers in different trades. Some groups were lucky enough to take part in that trade as well, including laying a brick and making your own yo-yo.

As one of the mentors said, "Don't build your future on someone else's judgment. Your future is your own to build." These words gave the girls the one thing that they need to succeed, *encouragement*.

Two Buildings Become One Garden City Collegiate (and that's just to start)

There's a new addition at Garden City Collegiate... and it's literally bringing staff and students together.

Since 1995, Garden City Collegiate has been one school operating between two unconnected buildings – the Garden City building and what was once Jefferson Junior High. With many students and staff having to travel outdoors from one building to the other, this gap created a lingering sense of two different schools. (The fact that people would have to deal with rain or freezing cold weather as they went back and forth wasn't particularly enjoyable either.)

All that has changed – and on May 12th, it will be made official as the school holds a grand opening event to celebrate the long-awaited and much anticipated addition.

The new space is designed to give Garden City Collegiate a superior central space for socializing. Boasting an abundance of natural light, high ceilings and seating for 250, there's plenty of room for people to meet, greet and even eat lunch from the "Go-pher Lunch" canteen.

Gym-Dandy

But the link is more than just a meeting place. It also houses a brand-new gymnasium and exercise area that will be the envy of schools throughout the province.

Saying the new gym is expansive is an understatement. It's one of the largest gym facilities in Manitoba, providing students with a place they



can pursue their health and fitness goals or cheer and watch school teams take on competitors. The space also adds opportunities for larger school events which will further bring everyone together.

Cheryl Senensky works in the main office at the school and knows how excited everyone is about the project finally coming together.

"The block-long school has increased the sense of school spirit as well as the students and staff pride in the school," says Senensky. "Some of the students have been saying things about how they love that there is a place for the kids to hang out and how it's a great place to go when you don't have classes."

Garden City Collegiate will show off its new space to the public with an exciting opening event on May 12th at 7 pm.

The evening will feature performances by the Garden City Senior Jazz Band, Vocal Jazz Group and the Reality Check Dance Group. Light refreshments will be served, courtesy of the Grade 11 and 12 Food & Nutrition Students. Tours of the entire school will also be offered by our student volunteers.


