## CONSTRUCTON COMPLEEE!



We are pleased that the construction project to make West St. Paul School fully accessible is complete. The construction project began last summer and continued until last month. The project included an elevator, a lift, a new front foyer and a staircase leading down to Red River Hall. The front of the school is a bright, open and welcoming space. The construction was a great learning opportunity for our students as they were able to watch the construction workers as they went about doing their jobs. Because of how and when the construction took place, there was very little disruption to regular school classes and movement of students inside the school.
We are pleased to announce that the school division has approved new capital projects to update the canteen area of Red River Hall and refurbish the terrazzo floors in the school. We expect this work to begin early in the summer.


## Balanced School Day Comes to West St. Paul School

The staff of West St. Paul has been researching and discussing the Balanced School Day for the upcoming 2012-2013 school year. We had staff do visitations at schools where the Balanced School Day has been implemented and we had a PD Day devoted to the research and implications of what it would mean for our West St. Paul students. At all stages of our discussions and in our PD Day, we have included members of the Parent Advisory Council. After all this discussion, we have decided to implement the Balanced School Day for next fall.

What is the Balanced School Day? Basically, it means that the school day will be divided into three sections (currently we have four)

- Three long instructional blocks
- Two nutrition breaks
- Two outdoor activity blocks

Why would we do this?

- This schedule allows for more instruction time with fewer interruptions.
- The schedule allows for longer lessons to continue without interruption.
- We can structure time in an integrated way while maintaining flexibility.
- Children concentrate and learn better when they eat well.
- The foods eaten during the first break provide the key nutrients for an active day.
- Children are not as hungry at the end of the day.

Research tells us those students who have a more regulated blood sugar level and who eat well:

- Perform better academically.
- Are absent and late less often.
- Function better behaviourally and emotionally.
- Have less anxiety, depression, and hyperactivity.
- Are more ready to learn.

We are looking forward to trying this new schedule in the fall. More information will come in the next two months. We will be putting together a nutrition package for families that will help you consider how food planning can support your students.

Throughout Friday and Saturday, we also participated in other activities that helped us learn about what it's like to not have access to food and water. We broke our fasting by having a potluck at the school. The fasting helped us really appreciate the food that we take so for granted everyday. The Famine was a huge success and we raised over $\$ 2700$ in donations. The money we raised is going to be sent to World Vision that will help provide proper food and nutrition to people in Africa. ## 30 Hour Famine

During the 30 hour famine, one of the activities we did on Friday was "Bigger or Better". The rules for "Bigger or Better" are that you are in groups of about 7 people and you start off with a paper clip. You go around Winnipeg looking for something to trade with anyone who might have something that is bigger or better. You are not allowed to go in West St Paul or Riverbend and you can't go to someone you know. You have a two hour time limit and if you don't make it back in time, your team will be disqualified. There are three winners - biggest item, most valuable item, and most creative item. The winners won a free Slurpee coupon for 7-11.

On Friday night we all went to the gym and we were divided into groups. We had to make a house out of cardboard and tape. We had about 15 minutes to build the houses. Our first objective was to go all around the school in the dark, and look for green and yellow pieces of paper that read 'water'. After the Grade 9 student helpers hid them, they were given a Sharpie marker. They had to try and find us while we were searching for water, and mark an ' $x$ ' on our hand. The teachers never told us which colour was contaminated. Each player had to have at least one clean coloured card. If you didn't have enough cards or enough clean cards, you received another ' $x$ ' on your hand. When we had 4 X 's, we "died" and were eliminated from the game. We had to find as many cards as possible, in order for our team to survive. During the second round, the Grade 9s hid little orange cards around the school, which read 'food'. There was no contaminated food in this round. Each player for each team, again, needed at least one food card. We did one more round, where we had to do food and water. In the final round, we had to sit inside our house, with our family, while the teachers shook the house and tried to tear it down to see if it was strong enough to support us. After that they surprised everybody and threw a big bucket of water at us!! Everybody was in shock, and so annoyed, yet they were laughing. We had to tear our houses down, and throw everything away in the dumpster. The point of the game is to know how people in Africa live and what they have to do to get food and water for their families. It also showed what their houses went through during severe weather storms and droughts.

After that, we played about 3 games of Hide and Go Seek, and then a game which is called Sardines. Sardines is a game similar to Hide and Go Seek, but it is where one person goes and hides, then everybody else has to go and try to find them, and hide with them.

Everybody had to be in their rooms by midnight the girls stayed in Mrs. Rempel's room and the boys stayed in Mr. Bencharski's room. The boys stayed up and played video games all night. The girls stayed up watching Modern Family and about an hour of Shark Night.

In the morning, everybody got up around 9:00 for the car rally at 10:00. A few girls went to get some water and poured it on Miss Yeo!!! She was sleeping at the time, but she didn't care. After that, everybody started to pour water on each other! At about 10:00, we met up in the gym and got into our groups for the car rally. There are 4 to 8 people in a group. Parents and teachers volunteered to drive. The groups are given a list of things they have to find around Winnipeg. For example, two pit stops were worth 61 points - one was at Polo Park and the other was The Forks. There were about 100 questions. Mr. Rempel went around Winnipeg looking for answers and writing the questions for us to answer. We had a 2 -hour period to find as many answers on the paper as we could. If we came late, would be disqualified from the game and points would be taken off.

When everybody came back from the car rally, around 12:10 p.m., we all had free time. The boys went to Mr. Bencharski's room and played video games and the girls watch Modern Family and ran around the school playing games.

At about 1:30 p.m. parents came with food for the potluck and that's when everyone started getting hungry! The girls laid in front of the door waiting for exactly 2:00 p.m. to hit so they could eat.

The duties and responsibilities of the Executive shall include:

Chair - Shall preside at meetings of the PAC Executive; shall set the agenda in consultation with the school Principal; shall chair meetings of the PAC; shall be ex-officio member(s) of all PAC committees; shall act as authorized signing officer(s) on bank accounts; shall have signing authority on official correspondence; shall coordinate all activities of the PAC executive between regular meetings.

Vice-Chair - Shall assist the Chair and in the absence of the Chair shall chair meetings and supervise the affairs of the PAC. In the event of resignation, incapacity or leave of absence of the Chair, the Vice-Chair shall fulfill those responsibilities.
