Administrator's Message

Autumn weather has been fine and conditions set for a full year of learning. As a school we have practiced fire drills and an evacuation drill. Each classroom has established their routines and small (and large) projects have begun. The excitement in the school is evident as students happily engage each other in learning.

As we enter November, some parents begin to think of the traditional report card. Of course the way a child's learning is communicated to parents has changed throughout the years. The telephone call has been overtaken by e-mail as the more common form of parent-teacher communication. E-mail works well for straightforward communication. Remember that at any time during the school year teachers are available for conversations and/or meetings to discuss individual student progress. Hopefully, only pleasant surprises await parents when they see their child's work at a parent-student-teacher conference. Expect report cards to go home with your child on Tuesday, November 23.

In the past decade, it has become more and more common for students to attend, and even lead the parent-student-teacher conference. Why? The most important factor in increasing student learning is self-reflection. Student performance increases when they are able to speak about and demonstrate their learning and talk about things they did well and ways to improve their own work. When given the opportunity to speak, students know very well what things they do well and what things they need to improve. Students beam when they are able to show and demonstrate their learning to an adult! Be certain to take the time to discuss your child's learning each day. If you haven't done so already, please complete and return the parent-student-teacher appointment form for your child's teachers as soon as the forms come home. Appointment times will be sent home with the student's report card.

They will be building pallet composting bins at the school with the hope of reducing the amount of waste the school sends to the landfill. Students and teachers are hoping to have the bins up and working in the next week or two. The long-range goal is to further the development of composting bins 1t's Compost Time! throughout the community.

Squash Soup: By: Rooms 4 and 9

Last school year, rooms 2 and 4 planted a vegetable garden. In the garden we planted pumpkins and squash.

In September we went to look at the garden. We learned that it takes a lot of space to grow pumpkins and squash. We did not harvest that many squash or pumpkins because we had planted too many and overcrowded the garden.

Students in room 9 harvested the few squash and one pumpkin that had grown in the garden.

After the squash were harvested, both rooms 4 and 9 observed the squash and pumpkins and sketched them in our notebooks.

Room 9 then scooped the seeds out of the inside of the squash. The squash was then pureed to prepare it to make soup.

Room 4 then began to research different recipes that could be used to make the soup. We found 4 different recipes and surveyed each other to decide which recipe we would make. We decided that it would be a great idea to choose ingredients out of each recipe to invent our own type of squash soup.

We got together with our older buddy class (Miss Los' grade 7 class). Room 4's jobs included washing all of the vegetables, peeling the carrots, measuring different liquids, putting things into the pot, and stirring it up. Our big buddies helped us with the cutting of the vegetables. It took us until the end of the day to make the soup.

The next day we got

together with our buddies before lunch to eat the soup. Before our buddies came we set the table and heated the soup.

We had a great time researching, surveying, graphing, measuring, cooking and eating!! Here is a copy of our squash soup recipe.

Room 4's Squash Soup Recipe

INGREDIENTS:

- 2 cups of cooked spaghetti squash
- 4 tablespoons of olive oil
- 1 large chopped onion
- 4 minced garlic cloves
- 2 tomatoes
- 3 1/2 carrots
- 4 celery stalks
- 1 teaspoon of curry powder
- 1 teaspoon of allspice
- 6 cups of either vegetable stock or chicken stalk Parsley

Salt & ground pepper

- 1/2 cup of cream
- 1 cup of water

DIRECTIONS:

In a saucepan, add olive oil and on medium flame and add the onions.

- 1. Cook the onions till they soften, then add the garlic and curry powder and
- 2. allspice. Stir it for about 2 minutes.
- Add carrots, tomatoes, celery and parsley. Fry for about 10 minutes or until vegetables are soft.
- 4. Add the squash to the sauce pan along with the vegetable or chicken stock and water.
- 5. Heat on low flame until a thick consistency, probably about 20 minutes
- 6. Now, season the soup with salt and ground pepper.
- Add cream just before you are ready to serve, heat for another five minutes and serve.
- 8. Put in bowls and add small amount of sour crème on top.

A message from Seven Oaks School Division Superintendent Brian O'Leary

Seven Oaks School Division has long made communicating with parents, students and community members a priority.

For years, this newsletter has been our way to bring you news on special events, programming changes and noteworthy people in the Division.

When we launched the Fact or Fiction campaign for fairer tax distribution, you read about it here first. Here, you learned about our innovative Bright Futures program and MET School pilot project. We have also used this publication to brag about our annual Arts in the Park celebration and many other milestone events that have happened in Seven Oaks schools over the years.

We are proud of our accomplishments and proud to share them with you. But this year we are trying something different.

Instead of using the newsletter to profile programs, events and news that – having been in your child's school on

a regular basis – you probably already know about, we will this year bring you stories we hope will inspire you and your children to explore the future and the possibility it holds.

We will introduce you to current students, teachers and community members doing extraordinary things. We will profile former students who have gone on to do things we never imagined, and those who followed their hearts and minds to an extraordinary destination.

And we hope reading these stories will help you help your kids reach for the stars – even if they are stars you don't yet know exist.

The dreaded question

Every one of us has at one time or another posed the question to a child: What do you want to be when you grow up?

We ask it as early as kindergarten and then repeatedly throughout the child's educational journey. We ask it so we can help children develop their paths early in life and so we can do everything possible to help them achieve their sole goal in life.

But I think it's time for that to change. When we ask a child what he or she wants to be, we inevitably use their answer to start shaping the course of that child's life.

When we predict the future we place limitations on children and potentially prevent them from achieving greatness simply because they haven't yet awakened their passion.

And we can do better.

Our jobs as educators (and, to some degree, your role as parents) shouldn't consist of creating expectations – we should be opening doors and providing support to help kids learn about themselves, their passions and their boundless potential.

We should be breaking moulds, not creating them.

Over the course of my career as an educator, principal and superintendent I have encountered many students who broke the mould and broke free of the preconceived course life and their support systems had set for them. One of the most memorable is a young man who I got to know quite well in my

first year as principal at Isaac Newton. Prior to that September, I was the vice-principal at Hugh John McDonald and had dealt with the student, Angus, as he was a bit of a troublemaker. Partway through my first year at the new school, Angus' dad – a hardworking man who raised his family best he could in a hard neighbourhood – called and asked if I could enrol the boy, who had just been kicked out of Hugh John for fighting.

I obliged, but told Angus' dad that he couldn't fight in my new school either. With a little extra attention and support, Angus graduated from Isaac Newton and went on into the world.

A few years ago, my phone rang and the voice on the other end said, "Hi Mr. O. I don't know if you remember me, but my name is Angus."

Of course I remembered.

Angus was in town visiting his parents, and they encouraged him to call me and catch up. He had to thank me, he said, for giving him a shot when no one else would. He wanted to tell me that he'd left Winnipeg and become an air traffic controller.

My heart almost burst that day and I can guarantee there is no better feeling than knowing you did something – anything, no matter how large in scale – to help a child who others had written off achieve greatness.

Fostering the future at all levels

As we started this year, I imparted much of this advice and many of my wishes upon all Seven Oaks teachers,

staff and administrators. I asked them to start anew this year, and start every day by seeing themselves through the eyes of their students.

I asked them to embrace the idea that it takes just 20 minutes to change a life – that taking two minutes a day for just 10 days might be enough to change a struggling student's life or spark passion in an otherwise indifferent mind.

Helping guide a learner through their path is about more than just teaching and – for parents – about more than just helping kids with their homework at the dinner table.

It is about possibility, openmindedness and exploration. It is about us – the Seven Oaks community – working together for the future.

No matter what your child's age or grade level, we can ensure they never sell themselves short and help them explore the boundless possibilities the world holds for them.

By opening our minds, we can open their eyes.

By helping them be passionate, we can help them grow.

By allowing them to grow, we can help them be happy.

I hope you enjoy the next eight months' stories – stories of inspiration, passion and happy people. People who came from where your kids are today.
