UNESCO SCHOOLS


The United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization (UNESCO) is a worldwide organization serving to promote peace. The purpose of UNESCO is to contribute to world peace by promoting collaboration between countries, via education, science and culture.

West St. Paul School joined the UNESCO Network in the fall 0f 2009. Throughout the year, we have been growing in our understanding of what it means to be a UNESCO School. We have been trying to live the beliefs written on the wall in the front foyer — Take Care of yourself. Take care of each other. Take care of this place.



The four themes of UNESCO include: world concerns, human rights, intercultural learning and sustainable living.

We have had support in connecting these themes to the social studies and science curriculum during two days of professional development. Ann McDarmid and Linda Mlodzinski, curriculum specialists from the Department of Education, led West St. Paul teachers through how the concepts of UNESCO schools are embedded in the Manitoba curriculum.



Connecting with Nature through Sustainable Development

With funds provided by a University of Manitoba study, classrooms have built two community gardens with the intention of providing students the opportunity to deepen their connections to nature and the outdoors. We see potential for these spaces as possible outdoor classrooms. Through a group visitation to the Discovery Centre, teachers explored the different teaching and learning possibilities that our school gardens can create.





Special points of interest:


- Manitoba Theatre for Young People presented two plays to West St. Paul Students.
- Over one hundred parents, grandparents and community members volunteered for the students of our school.
- Six members of the West St. Paul staff presented Professional Development sessions for other teachers in the province.

Technology Plan

This year we posted all our newsletter on-line and gave parents a choice about receiving the newsletter in paper form. By January, families were receiving an email notice to notify them of the on-line posting.

We have also updated our school web-site. This is a work in progress and will continue in the next year. We are moving towards weekly updates of the calendar.

Several teachers have begun work on teacher web-sites as a vehicle for parent-teacher communication. Our last professional development day gave all teachers the tools to develop classroom websites as a means of communicating with parents.

Professional Learning

The West St. Paul staff had two school wide Professional Development days focussing on sustainable development and how the tenets of UNSECO schools are embedded into the social studies and science curricula

The Middle Years team had, as their focus, the implementation of the new assessment model. As this was our first year working with this model, the work with students and families will continue next year.

In addition the Middle Years teachers spent their professional development time working with Dr. Miriam Small and Trevor Brown incorporating math manipulatives into our Math teaching. The professional text for this group was Big Ideas with Dr. Small. It was a wonderful opportunity to meet the author and be able to work through the ideas with her.

The Early Years teaching team (K- 5) participated in various professional development opportunities over the course of the 2009/2010 school year. We had some Education Leave in which we collaborated with teachers from two other schools to deepen our understanding of how we look at and document children's work.

Several teachers also took part of a research study with the University of Manitoba around sustainable development. This study connected our work to the two days of in-servicing about the connections between sustainable development to the social studies and science curricula.

Nine teachers had the opportunity to attend a conference sponsored by the UNESCO schools network. This conference helped to further teacher knowledge of sustainable development and world issues such as child labour and child poverty and how those things are connected to the curriculum.

A group of teachers participated in an after-school book club, reading and discussing the professional text "Talking, Drawing, Writing: Lessons for Our Youngest Writers", by Martha Horn and Mary Ellen

Giacobbe. We were intrigued by the new ways of thinking about what the writing process can look and sound like in our classrooms.

Teachers from West St. Paul participated on the Seven Oaks School Division Information and Technology development team, the Middle Years Math team and the divisional Sustainable Development Team. These opportunities allow teachers to demonstrate leadership in the division as well as leadership among their West St. Paul colleagues.

We also had two days of in-servicing with Seven Oaks divisional staff leaders discussing what inclusion means, how to differentiate instruction for all learners and how to work effectively in collaborative teams.
