On September 22, 2018, over 400 people attended the Open House at the Learning and Service Centre. We had cold weather, but a MOST warm reception! Staff generously shared their initiatives around gardening, land-based learning, connecting to nature and a myriad of hands-on learning projects. Naming Ceremony

Ozhaawashkwaa Animikii-Bineshi Aki Onji Kinimaagae' Inun (Blue Thunderbird Land-Based Teachings Learning Centre)

On September 27, 2018, Elder Dan Thomas and Elder Mary Courchene held a Naming and Pipe Ceremony on this land. Elder Mary Courchene shared that she had a dream where "Land-Based Teachings Learning Centre" came to her as a name for our new, shared place. When Elder Dan Thomas held the Pipe Ceremony, he had a vision of a big blue thunderbird "whose wings were outspread, covering this land here, that we are on".

The first part of our name, "Ozhaawashkwaa Animikii-Bineshi" means Blue Thunderbird in the Ojibwe language. This is the spirit name for our centre. The second part of our name, "Aki Onji Kinimaagae' Inun" means Land-Based Teachings Learning Centre.

Each year we will feast the name. In spring of 2019 we will mark the territory over which the Bineshi spread its wings by placing a post at each corner of the land, and tied to each post will be coloured ribbons.

To hear this name pronounced, please visit our website: <u>click here</u>. Elders know it will take time to learn the name, so they offer this nickname: "Aki Centre" (Land Centre). This way, we keep our languages together, signifying our shared journey.

Soil Sampling

Touching, smelling, and looking for patterns on the landscape are great ways to get to know the soil. Our geography and history also lend us important clues and answers. Soil sample lab results can consolidate our observations with numerical values reflecting our soils composition. These numbers can help us to see the effects of our stewardship efforts over time, and help us to choose the right practices for our soil needs.

In 2017, when a soy bean crop still grew on our land, patterns in the crop were noticeable. In some areas the crop did not grow at all, in other areas the crop grew shorter, and in other areas the crop looked just fine! By collecting observations, historical context, as well as soil samples, we found our land is slightly saline, holds a lot of water, and could use a boost of nutrients.

Soil sampling is often a fall task. A sampling tool, such as a probe or auger, is helpful in retrieving a sample of soil from various depths. Samples are bagged, labelled, and taken to a lab. Results are returned, and an agronomist or soil specialists is very helpful in understanding the results. Marla Riekman, Manitoba Agriculture Soil Management Specialist, generously offered her expertise to share with SOSD on how soil samples are taken, and some observations she made while we sampled. Timeline:

- October 2017: Phase 1 Construction begins (Service Centre, Pond excavation)
- May 2018: Oat Cover crop sown
- **June 2018**: 3 km trails constructed, swales dug and sculpted
- July Sept. 2018: Remnant prairie surveyed for biodiversity. Seeds collected.
- August 2018: Service Centre complete
- August 2018: Circle Garden relocated to 1985 Grassmere Road
- September 22: Open House
- **September 27**: Naming Ceremony
- October 2018: Learning Centre Construction begins, Tree Nursery is installed, Soil Testing with MB Ag
- October 2018: Partnership with TDFEF, supporting prairie restoration and seed procurement
- January 2019: Partnership with Winnipeg Foundation, Reconciliation Grant, supporting prairie restoration, education and relationship building at the Aki Centre through land-based teachings, experiences and shared stewardship of the land.

Coming Up in 2019:

- -Planting the Circle Garden, teachings
- -Developing a vegetable garden
- -Passive Solar Greenhouse
- -Ceremony space, Tipi and Sweatlodge
