SPAGHETTI BRIDGE COMPETITION



The Spaghetti Bridge Competition was held on March 15, 2014, at Kildonan Place Shopping Centre. The Spaghetti Bridge competition is for reminding Canadians the importance of their career choices for the future. It's been held every year in Manitoba since 1995. The APEGM's (Association of Professional Engineers and Geoscientists of Manitoba) goal is to reach 10 000 pounds of pasta to donate to Winnipeg Harvest. This year they raised over 15,000 pounds of

pasta for Winnipeg Harvest for all of the pasta bridges that were broken.

At the end of the competition you can win \$250 for first prize, \$200 for second and \$150 for third for each category. This year at the Spaghetti Bridge Competition about 75 entries of students grades 7-12 competed. A grade 11 girl broke the record by holding 266.64 lbs with her triangular bridge, and also someone in grades 1-6 got to 251 lbs with their bridge.





There were four people that went to the contest from Room 25: Riley Montgomery, Frenchy Saligumba, Faith Cruz and Pauline Mararac. Our class raised approximately 26.10 lbs of food for Winnipeg Harvest. The contest was fun, but it was a bit tiring waiting to get our bridge tested. It was cool watching other different bridges get tested. The teacher we built our bridge with was Mr. Cieszecki. He was the one that signed us up and went to the competition with us.

Christine Slater who is of Cree and Ojibway decent, graciously has been visiting ALL of our classrooms over the last month to share her talent and knowledge. Christine provided students with the oral historical background behind beading teachings. She began her sessions by introducing herself, her background experiences, personal life experiences, her traditional name, and some examples of her beading. She also talked about the teachings that go along with the beading and brought shared traditional drumming and a song. The feedback from the students and staff has been overwhelmingly positive.

Thank you so much to Christine for sharing with us her invaluable talents and knowledge.


Aboriginal Art

Jaimie Isaac is of Ojibway decent. She is currently completing her Masters in Indigenous Curatorial Fine Arts. She introduced her session to the grade 8 students with a 10 minute Power Point to introduce the Indian Group of 7, with images of each member's artwork with differing styles. The one over-arching theme is storytelling. The artists share traditional sacred stories through their artworks. Jaimie discusses the goals of the Indian Group of 7 and how/why they got started. She describes and shows the woodland style of art (otherwise known as Anishinabe Style of Art). Some student groups had the opportunity to try to identify the style of each artist.

The session ends with an applied art activity. Students first sketch an idea, they then pick an artist's artwork to reproduce, OR draw/paint their own image and using the specific style of an artist they liked. Thank you very much Jaimie for sharing your knowledge and talents with us.

Traditional Craft Making


David Boulanger visited our classes here at ÉSOMS to teach us how to make traditional rattles and soap. We used natural substances from plants and animals. For the soap, we learned about the traditional medicines - sage, sweetgrass and cedar. He also gave us some juniper to add. The soap smelled very natural and fantastic.

For the rattles we used deer hide, red willow, sinew, and corn kernels. We had to soak the hide, trace our shape, cut, sew, and bind it together. We dried it with sand inside so that once it hardened the shape would be formed. Then we took the sand out, and put in 7 or 14 kernels. This was a great experience and we all really enjoyed ourselves. We will treasure the gifts that we made. Kitchi Meegwetch David!






Life and Learning at ÉSÒMS La vie et l'apprentissage


As part of our inquiry and learning about Canadian Confederation, we each researched, wrote about and sketched (upside down!) a Father of Confederation. Here are some examples of what we accomplished!

Sir Oliver Mowat

Sir Oliver était né le 22 juillet 1820 et il est mon père de confédération. Quand le Canada était sous le nom la Dominion du Canada son capital à ce temps était Kingston, la ville de naissance de Sir Oliver Mowat. Les parents de Mowat sont écossais. Sir Oliver Mowat était dans les politiques à Toronto en 1857. En 1872 Mowat était le premier de l'Ontario pour vingt-quatre ans. Sir Oliver Mowat a inventée le bulletin de vote qui a vraiment aider la processus de vote. William Alexander Henry

Le 1^{er} Julliet 1867, une des meilleures journées qui a changé le monde! C'est le jour que le Canada a devenu un pays et qui était responsable? Trente-six hommes et un de ses hommes à une place spéciale dans mon cœur et cette personne est William Alexander Henry parce qu'il est la personne que j'ai choisi pour apprendre plus à propos. William A. Henry était né le 30 décembre 1816 dans Halifax et il a décédé le 3 mai 1888. Peu de temps après gu'il était né, il a déménagé à Antigonish en Nouvelle Écosse. Il a participé à l'éc ole secondaire d'Halifax et après il a étudié la loi. Il a était marié à Sophie C. Macdonald et Cristinna Macdonald. Il a joué un rôle dans la confédération du Canada parce qu'il était responsable de convaincre les habitants du Nouvelle-Écosse à joindre la confédération. Henry a participé à toutes les trois réunions de la confédération et il était une de seulement dix personnes à participé à toutes les réunions. Dans l'administration de Tupper de 1863, Henry est devenu Procureur général et un choix d'évidents comme l'un des délègues aux conférences. Il était aussi maire d'Halifax entre 1870-1871 précède par Stephen Tobin et réussi par William Dunbar. Il est aussi devenue le députe membre libéral d'Antigonish, une circonscription largement catholique romaine. Comme John A Macdonald, William A. Henry est un des hommes qui a aidé l'avenir du Canada! 

Trip to Winnipeg Harvest



On March 17th, our class went to Winnipeg Harvest. For those who don't know, Winnipeg Harvest is a non-profit food distribution centre that supports starving and hungry people that can't afford good food. Before we went to Winnipeg Harvest we collected food donations from our classroom and we got about 45 pounds of food to give. Winnipeg Harvest also provides for school and community centre's breakfast programs, food banks and soup kitchens across the city. We went upstai rs on our tour to the community kitchen. A community kitchen, for

the people that don't know, is a kitchen where anyone can eat and/or work. Winnipeg Harvest doesn't only give food, they also give things like diapers, baby formula, baby cereal, dog and cat food. On a slow day, Harvest gets about 400 callers a day. On a busy day they get about 800 callers a day. Harvest has 354 agencies and about 200 volunteers a day. Winnipeg Harvest helps many people because many people in Winnipeg are still poor because they can't find a job to earn money. The food from Winnipeg Harvest is free but you have to show your health card (per person) so you can get food. They also help the community by asking others to volunteer to help others in the community. It's very important for other people to have this experience because they can think about how they can help and donate food to other families because just one person can change the world. I also think it was important to go on this field trip because sometimes we need

to wake up and smell the roses because not everybody has the same things as us. I think some people should take this tour or go on this field trip because sometimes we think that we have nothing, but some people really don't have much to live on. Maybe less-developed countries or even some people in your own neighborhood don't have lots to live on and we need to help our own community too. I think young children should go on this tour/trip so they know that not everybody has food. When we went we put rice into bags and put about 30 bags into each box. Harvest



sorts all the food as fair as possible. You will become a hero because you help over 150 families in just one day by putting rice into bags! People have to know that wasting food is bad. Many people never experience being poor, that's why they have to learn how to save and share food. The spirit of Harvest is to help and to give and that is exactly what they have been doing for many years.
