Dear Parents/Guardians,

A vision screening will be carried out for all grade 7 students. This screening is designed to uncover signs of any possible vision difficulty which may interfere with school progress. It is not intended to be a substitute for the vision examination performed by an Ophthalmologist or Optometrist. If you do not wish that your child participate in this no-cost vision screening, please contact the school.

Children who are currently wearing glasses will not be screened. Parents of children who wear glasses will receive a form to take or send to their Ophthalmologist or Optometrist to assist the school in the best programming for their child.

If you receive a notice from the school after the vision screening has been completed requesting that you refer your child for a professional eye examination, please follow-up by making an appointment with an eye doctor (Ophthalmologist/Optometrist) of your choice. Ask the eye doctor to complete the form sent to you by the school and then return this completed form to the school.

If you require any further information, please contact Mrs. Kiva or Mrs. Khan at the school.

Change in School Bus Cancellation Policy

Metro Winnipeg School Superintendents have made a change in the policy for cancellation of school bus service due to cold weather.

The new policy will use the temperature reading at The Forks instead of the Airport.

School bussing will be cancelled if the wind-chill reading is -45 or colder at 6:00 a.m. at The Forks according to Environment Canada.

Notice of school bus cancellations will be provided to media outlets and posted on school division websites as soon as the 6:00 a.m. reading is posted by Environment Canada.

Metro Winnipeg School Divisions are: Louis Riel, Pembina Trails, River East Transcona, St. James Assiniboia, Seven Oaks and Winnipeg. Catholic schools and the Gray Academy also follow the same policy.

The change was made as weather conditions at The Forks are closer to weather conditions in most residential areas where children are waiting for school buses. This should result in fewer cancellations.









Room 19 - Mr. Nault

Op Art


During the month of November room 19 has been looking at type of art known as op art (optical art). Victor Vasarely and




Josef Albers created the type of art known as Op Art.

Forest In a Jar


Once upon a time Mrs. McDonald's/Ms. Hunter's class was doing a project on succession. We studied the life of plants by first putting dirt and water in a jar. It was really swampy and didn't smell that great. Then we planted a water plant which died and rotted. It was

fun to put the bird seed in, to see whose plants would grow the most. We weren't supposed to eat

the seeds even though some students wanted to. Then we started planting seeds in the jar which began to grow, which took over the water plant's habitat. We were able to see the roots in the jar. We made journals of our forests which

explained the changes in the growing process and

the abiotic and biotic changes. The water plant molded and died until a new habitat took over. Each time the plants grew a little bit we got to record it in our journals.
