KEEPING BALANCE & GITCHI MISAWEDAMOWINAN

Keeping Balance Schedule - Student programming is provided at:

Gitchi Misawedamowinan (Keeping Balance Day Program) provides daily programming from 12:00 until 3:00 p.m. For both the day & after school program, the main Traditional Teaching that is the foundation of the Classroom at all venues is RESPECT - respect for oneself, respect for others, and respect for our surroundings. There are Traditional Teachings and stories about respecting the things that we are provided to work with on a daily basis. This helps the youth take ownership and responsibility of their work space, accountability of the materials that they use, and gives them a sense of pride upon completion of a project.

On a daily basis the Teaching of Caring/Sharing is also tested and/or practiced. All of our activities involve the sharing of materials. Youth have to wait their turn to use items and are often required to help each other. There are times when a youth wants to give up on an activity. We are all involved with encouraging each other to finish. Turns are taken by the youth to help with the smudge if they want, to clean up and wash the dishes, to help serve snack, etc.

Activities that youth have completed include creating their own personal Identity Shield (this is an art activity that requires personal thought and self-reflection; how does one want others to view them; how much can one share with others comfortably), Dreamcatchers (this activity requires great patience, organization, strength, and creativity; youth quickly learn to respect things that appear easier than they are), Treasure Boxes (fun activity involving painting, organization, creativity), Friendship Bracelets (involves looking at the world around us; teachings of respect, Caring & sharing, bravery), foxtails (Creating a tool used for agility, target practice, traditionally used for hunting, now played with as a recreational game; safety), baskets (patience, weaving designs and using motor skills), etc.


