Jenna is reading Homer's Odyssey. In the following essay, she is sharing her reflections with us.

AN INVITATION TO READ HOMER'S ODYSSEY

Every hero starts out as nothing more than a child, a pupil in need of a teacher. Telemachus was just that – until the bright-eyed goddess Athena visited him.

Telemachus, the son of the strong and famous Odysseus, is facing a crisis at home. Unwelcome guests have invaded his home. With his father missing and his mother held captive by the home-invaders, Telemachus must step up and become the man and hero he was meant to be. With Athena as his advisor and courage in his heart, Telemachus embarks on an adventure that will change his life forever.

Telemachus is still a child when Athena first meets him. He is simply sitting around dreaming of a better future. Homer tells us that, "...nobody noticed her at first but Telemachus, who was sitting disconsolate among the Suitors, (the home-invaders), dreaming of how his noble father might come back from out of the blue, drive all these gallant pell-mell from the house, and so regain his royal honors and reign over his own once more." Athena sees that in his heart was the strength and willpower he needed to set out in search of his father. I believe that Athena knows what she was doing when she gave Telemachus hope, by saying, "... though the gods are putting every difficulty in his way, I still maintain that the good Odysseus is not dead but alive somewhere on earth." Then she transforms into a bird and flies off to leave Telemachus with the knowledge that a goddess is on his side.

As Telemachus begins to take control of his awful situation, he finds his courage with each step. He begins to believe in the possibility although many have long dismissed the thought of his father's return. It is with wise words and daring that he speaks to the people of Ithaka, his home island. I believe that is his best quality. But his bravery and hope is inspired by Athena, although she is disguised as another by the name of Mentor. She says to him "Today has proved you, Telemachus, neither a coward nor fool, nor destined to be such, if we are right in thinking that your father's manly vigor has descended to his son". It is here that he begins to take his first steps to becoming a leader, a hero.

Telemachus must learn to be wise. Even with a goddess as an advisor he cannot rely on chance. After Athena gathers a crew and finds him a boat for his adventure he must take on the challenge of finding information about where Odysseus is now. Telemachus first visits Nestor, King of Pylos. As he meets with Nestor, Athena helps him give spirited replies to his host and even though tempting offers of large gifts and feasts are offered, Telemachus turns them down. The one thing he wants most doesn't come plated with gold or served on a silver tray. No, what he wants is to know where his father is. As he goes from one place to another searching for clue of his dad's location, he meets up with Helen and Menelaus. And Menelaus knows something about an island and a Nymph by the name of Calypso whose primary guest, Odysseus, has become her captive.

With this new information in hand and a path laid before his feet Telemachus must sail across the ocean. But his journey will not be easy. Poseidon is angry at Odysseus and the Suitors are planning an ambush for Telemachus' return. Will Telemachus find his father or doesfate have something else in store for him? This inspiring and incredible page turner will keep you guessing from page one. Read the story of a real boy who became a hero.

WORKING TO HELP AT WINNIPEG HARVEST

On February 29, we went to Winnipeg Harvest. While we were there, we learned how the food gets donated and how it gets delivered to the hungry. The people who require food fill out a form to get food. Then the form goes to Winnipeg Harvest. Then they receive the food. They have to go to their local distribution center to get the food.

We sorted potatoes and onions in boxes for delivery. We sorted and packed 35 boxes of potatoes and 1 box of onions and donated 82.6 pounds of food. Some

potatoes were soft and had holes in them. If they were soft or if they had holes in them, they were

discarded. The same goes for the onions but they were soft and mouldy. It was hard to find onions that were in good shape, but we managed to find them.

Our tour guide showed us a map of where the food gets shipped.

- -60,000 people get fed in a month
- They get 400 calls a day
- -The volunteers get free meals
- -Over 50% of people getting fed are children

THE DANGER OF A SINGLE STORY AN EXPERIENCE IN CRITICAL LITERACY

In class, we watched the video, *Kony 2012* (http://www2.invisiblechildren.com/videos/37119711), made by the organization *Invisible Children*. This film is about the abduction of children who are then used as child soldiers by Joseph Kony and his so-called Lord's Resistance Army (LRA). Our first reactions to the film were sympathetic, we felt a connection to the emotional side and we really wanted to help.

We watched the video for a second time and had a guest speaker, Mr. McCloud, who talked to us about the video. He explained what is happening in Uganda and shared information that is missing from the video. He showed us a video response from Rosebell's blog (http://rosebellkagumire.com), a Ugandan multimedia journalist, who speaks about the danger of a single story. Rose explained a part in the video where they showed a clip of African children being scared of going home and sleeping on the floor. But this clip was four years old and the situation is much better now; not because of *Invisible Children*. Rose also suggested that *Invisible Children* is just another "want-to-be-hero" and this organization needs to know more about the people they are trying to help.

This really got us thinking. After some discussions in class, we decided that we do not want to drop this issue. In fact, we are going to do more research about what is going on in Uganda, what is actually being done (and has been done) to help and then we are planning on making a video response to the *Kony 2012* video. Our goal is not to create a single-sided view but instead to teach people that there is always more than one side to every story.
