
MY SCIENCE PROJECT:

UNCOVERING CELL-SPECIFIC GENE REGULATORY NETWORKS IN PLANTS TO IMPROVE SEED QUALITY AND SOLVE FOOD SHORTAGE PROBLEMS

I am a grade-eight student. I entered the SBCC (*Sanofi BioGENEius Challenge Canada*) competition 2012. The purpose of this research was to try and find gene regulatory networks in certain compartments/tissues across different stages of development of *Arabidopsis* (a plant related to the mustard family and similar to canola). If we find those networks we can start to manipulate the genes in those compartments to improve seed qualities. We want to improve seed qualities because there is a growing world-wide population, right now at 7 billion, and in the future there might be problems with food production which will lead to a shortage of food.

To find these networks, seed compartments were compared to each other from pre-existing genechip data (a GeneChip is an array that shows what genes are being expressed at certain time periods and the level of expression of those genes in the genome; in the genome of Arabidopsis there are 22 000 genes). This data was clustered at many levels using specific computer programs. I found that certain co-expressed genes in the seed coat had large levels of gene expression which suggests that there could be interesting gene regulatory networks.



Another computer program was used to enrich my data to find GO terms (a gene ontology term predicting biological function), DNA Sequence motifs (a binding site for a Transcription Factor), Metabolic Pathways as well as Transcription Factors (TFs bind to motifs and create certain biological processes needed for seed development and growth) which make up gene regulatory networks. Within the network I looked at Transcription Factor glabra2 (GL2), which was predicted to play a part in the seed coat. The seed coat helps to protect the seed and produces oils. But what would happen if we started to manipulate the genes that use GL2?

Research of this type can help with the world's food issues. At the competition I was competing against 28 different Gr.9 & Gr.10 projects from all across Manitoba. For all of my research and hard work I received the 3rd place award of \$600, although the true award was being in the competition itself, expanding my knowledge and learning by doing hands-on research.



One of the new heads tried to bite Chris, but he dodged it and it got his dad.




Chris and his mom ran around the tree. The creature started to fly toward Chris.


Just then Chris then realized that the creature wanted its gold back. So he dropped the drachmas and ran.


