

- Daily riddle announcements




"I like Watch Me Throw the Ball because Piggie found a ball then Gerald said he threw that ball away. I liked the story and how they make the pictures."

"You have to read the book In the Tree House because I like the story. There is a tree house and




"You have to read this book because it is kind of funny. Piggie is trying to fly and she hops,



"You got to read Happy Pig Day because Happy Pig Day is funny and the author is good. He writes funny things because he makes them silly."




"You have to read this book because there are mermaids in it and they have to find treasures. I like reading about mermaids."

"I like the Pokemon book because there are cool Pokemons in it. I like reading about Pikachu."




"I like this book because it reminds me of my cabin at Beaver creek."

# All programs are <u>Free of Charge</u> and are for families living in the Seven Oaks School Division catchment.

Programs are for Parents/caregivers and children ages 0 - 5 and run on Monday and Wednesday mornings. Together, you will take part *in free* <u>play, story time, rhymes, songs and art exploration</u>. Registration is ongoing.

Please note, special procedures have been put in place to ensure the safety and well being of all who attend our Parent/Child Preschool Program:

- Limited number of children per program.
- Only one adult per child is to attend.
- Hand sanitization is required upon entry to the building.
- Social distancing of two meters to be adhered to, except for members who reside in the same household.
- Non-medical masks or face coverings are required for adults and encouraged for children. Children under 2 yrs. are not required to wear masks.
- Families must go directly to the community room and leave the building immediately following program.



# COVID-19 INFORMATION FOR THE 2020–2021 SCHOOL YEAR

**COVID-19** is a new virus, and there is no vaccine or treatment for it at this time. Most people who get COVID-19 will have mild symptoms, but for some this virus can cause serious illness and even death. Most people who get sick with COVID-19 can recover at home, but need to isolate and monitor their symptoms. Care at home can help stop the spread of COVID-19 and help ensure that health care resources are available to those with severe COVID-19 symptoms requiring hospitalization. Speak to your public health nurse if you are not able to isolate at home. Isolation from other people is the best way to protect yourself, your loved ones and people in the community.

### Do I need to isolate and for how long?

### If you:

- have tested positive for COVID-19 and are well enough to recover at home. Isolate for at least 10 days from the time your symptoms started. During this time, a public health official will call you once daily to ask about your temperature and your symptoms. Your public health official will tell you when you can stop isolating.
- have COVID-19 symptoms, have been tested and are waiting for your test results. Isolate at home while you are waiting to get the laboratory results from a health care provider. If your COVID-19 test results are negative, but you have symptoms, or have travelled or been exposed to a case, you will need to continue to self-isolate (quarantine) for the entire 14 days and until you have been symptom free for 24 hours. If your COVID-19 test results are positive, a public health official will call you.
- have cold or flu-like symptoms but have not been exposed to COVID-19 through travel or contact with a case. People with a new onset of any one symptom listed in column A or any two or more symptoms listed in column B), should get tested for COVID-19.

### Fever / chills

- Cough
- Sore throat/ hoarse voice

- Difficulty breathing
- Loss of taste or smell
- Vomiting or diarrhea for more than 24 hours

- Runny nose
- Muscle aches
- Fatigue
- Pink eye (conjunctivitis)
- Headache

There are 10 spaces available for Kindergarten students. **Kindergarten students must be registered** 

Due to Covid-19 restrictions, the registration process will be completed online.

Should you be unable to register on-line, please call the school office to book an in-person registration appointment.

### The following is required to register your child for Kindergarten:

- Completed registration form (available after February 22)
- 2 copies—Proof of address document

Acceptable documents: Utility bills, lease or home purchase documents, Tax assessment documents. <u>Manitoba Health cards will not be accepted.</u>

• 1 copy—Proof of birthdate document

Acceptable documents: Birth certificate, baptismal certificate or passport. <u>Manitoba Health cards will not be accepted.</u>

When registering on-line, it will be helpful to have ready copies/photos of these required documents on the device or computer you will be using at the time of registration. During registration, there will be sections for you to upload the documents into your registration form.

Please note: we will be following up within 2 business days of receiving your online registration to verify your information and complete the registration process.

We now have 31 dedicated patrols helping our students and families safely cross streets and ride the bus. As we have experienced a wide range of temperatures, we have been working with patrols to ensure they are dressed appropriately for the weather.

# Cold weather clothing and shift guidelines when the temperature OR windchill are as follows:



-9 or above: Patrols go out for their regular shifts of 15 minutes on post. Warm jackets, boots, hats, and mitts are recommended.

**-10 to -27:** Patrols do regular shifts. They MUST wear ski/snow pants, warm jacket, boots, hats and mitts/gloves.



-27 to -34: Patrols will do reduced shifts (5-10 minutes depending on conditions). Patrols MUST wear all winter clothing above and a scarf or neck warmer is recommended.



Thank you to parents for helping your patrols to prepare and dress for the conditions. If you need any of the above items and are having difficulty obtaining them for any reason (retail restrictions, delivery delays, lost items, budget) we can lend them these items for as long as needed. Just have your child ask Ms.

rower patrollers are patrols who are recognized by their supervisors and peers for doing a great job. Power patrollers are on time, dressed appropriately, ready to do their job safely and well. They keep their attention on people and traffic while on post, work well with their partners and captains, ask questions when needed, and act proactively to solve problems. Way to go!
